What is the Youth Summit?

Youth Voices in Action, or VIA, has been empowering youth since 2015. VIA was founded after the Albuquerque PARCC walkouts by Albuquerque Public School students and has since been a part of building student's leadership skills in the area of social justice and specifically Education and Youth Rights. The main goal of the VIA Student Led Youth Summit is to provide students with trainings and workshops that will develop them as leaders, public speakers and students who understand the root causes of the inequities within the education system. The youth summit allows for a space where youth come together to speak openly about things they would like to see changed inside of their schools without being tokenized or ignored. VIA focuses on encouraging students, specifically students of color, who are not surrounded by academic or personal support, to be able to see their own potential and to develop the skills necessary to lead campaigns to make change in their schools because we believe those who are directly affected by an unjust education system have the ultimate power to create change. When youth are empowered, they can create changes, those changes work as a domino effect for other students to also become leaders. All they need is a space to do so. That's why VIA, as students, created the student-led youth summit.

This year's summit was held at the Berna Facio Professional Development Center. This also marks VIA's sixth year coordinating a student-led summit for the Albuquerque Public School district. Unlike past years, this year's summit was held in September rather than our annual April summit due to complications in transportation. This was also the only year we had an only middle schools summit.

This year's summit theme was "Our Future,Our Voice". We choose this theme because of the issues of political climate that are affecting our community. We believe that students voices need to be at the center of policy development especially within education because those policies directly affect youth and their futures.



WORKSHOPS

The workshops presented at the youth summit were chosen by our youth summit committee and are issues that the students believed were relevant to their educational and personal experiences. All of the workshops were led by young people ages 12-24.

The workshops that were presented were:

1. How to create change 101 -

In this workshop, youth learned how to use their voice to create positive change and become a leader. Youth also learned about other students who have created change throughout history!

2. Gender Justice/ Justicia de Genero (SPANISH) -

En este taller hablaron sobre la identidad de género. Aprendieron sobre identidad y las intersecciones del Feminismo.



3. Who invented education? -

In this workshop youth discussed the history of the education system! Youth learned; Why was it invented, What are some problems, What are the good things and more!

4. Youth Justice 101 -

In this workshop youth learned about student rights and the history of youth justice! Youth also did an activity about the juvenile justice system and the school to prison pipeline.

This year we decided to hold workshops not only for students but teachers as well. We discussed how teachers can be better supported by APS and community.



What is happening in education & how can you be involved –

In this workshop teachers and chaperones discussed the education lawsuit Yazzie/Martinez vs. State of NM and what it means for them and their students.

WALL OF BURNING ISSUES

During the Summit we did an activity "The Wall of Burning Issues" where students write on a sticky note any issue they're passionate about. Then, we read all the sticky notes and put them in categories of campaigns that we, as VIA can work on in the future.
