What is the Youth Summit?

Youth Voices in Action, or VIA, has been empowering youth since 2015. VIA was founded after the Albuquerque PARCC walkouts by Albuquerque Public School students and has since been a part of building student's leadership skills in the area of social justice and specifically Education and Youth Rights. The main goal of the VIA Student Led Youth Summit is to provide students with trainings and workshops that will develop them as leaders, public speakers and students who understand the root causes of the inequities within the education system. The youth summit allows for a space where youth come together to speak openly about things they would like to see changed inside of their schools without being tokenized or ignored. VIA focuses on encouraging students, specifically students of color, who are not surrounded by academic or personal support, to be able to see their own potential and to develop the skills necessary to lead campaigns to make change in their schools because we believe those who are directly affected by an unjust education system have the ultimate power to create change. When youth are empowered, they can create changes, those changes work as a domino effect for other students to also become leaders. All they need is a space to do so. That's why VIA, as students, created the student-led youth summit.

This year, 2022 was the fifth year VIA coordinated a student-led youth summit for all Albuquerque Public Schools and the second year that the summit was virtual. VIA was fortunate enough to receive the *Equity in Albuquerque Mini Grant Program of the Office of Equity and Inclusion* and was able to stipend 3 youth interns to coordinate our summit, stipends for youth presenters and provide food for the students who attended the summit.

This year's summit theme was **EMPOWER**. Students chose this theme because we believe that every young person should be empowered to be a leader in their community. When youth have the resources and support to become leaders then they are able to create real long lasting change. Students who empower and uplift other students help our communities grow and stay safe.

WORKSHOPS

The workshops presented at the youth summit were chosen by our youth summit committee and are issues that the students believed were relevant to their educational and personal experiences. All of the workshops were led by young people ages 12-24.

The workshops that were presented were:

Food Justice (Bilingual)

This workshop was our first fully bilingual workshop in Spanish and English and taught students about Food Justice and what it means to not only have culturally based and healthy school lunches but also, where our food comes from, how it is processed in APS and why school gardens and food sovereignty is imoirtant. Students identified solutions to certain food issues and were excited to learn more about their own school gardens.

Is the education system racist/discriminatory?

Students learned the history of the education system and issues students have had to overcome throughout generations of cycles of oppression for students of color. They also were given a timeline of student advocacy and policy change that was led by young people. They also learned about ways they can create a more equitable education system for their own communities.

History of youth organizing


This workshop taught students the history of youth organizing and the different ways that students can be involved in their communities. This workshop focused specifically on how to be a community organizer and why its important to speak up.

Civic Engagement & Climate Change

I n this workshop students learned about civic engagement and how to be an advocate for climate change.. The workshop taught participants the struggle New Mexico youth face around climate change and what YUCCA and other youth organizations are doing to help change policies.

WALL OF BURNING ISSUES

During the Summit we did an activity "The Wall of Burning Issues" where students write on a sticky note any issue they're passionate about Using JamBoard. Then, we read all the sticky notes and put them in categories of campaigns that we, as VIA can work on in the future. The following table are the future campaigns students would like VIA to work on.
